Bible In A Year Reading Plan

Day 120: Nehemiah 13-Esther 4

Consider the public reading and interpretation of the Law by Ezra and the Levites in Nehemiah 8-9. How does the people's response of repentance and commitment to obedience upon hearing God's word inspire you to prioritize the study and application of Scripture in your own life? Explore Nehemiah's prayer of confession and intercession on behalf of the people in Nehemiah 9. How does Nehemiah's humble acknowledgment of Israel's history of disobedience and God's faithfulness challenge you to pray fervently for spiritual renewal and restoration in your own community?



Consider Mordecai's challenge to Esther to use her position for the deliverance of their people in Esther 4. How does Mordecai's encouragement to Esther to fulfill her destiny and calling inspire you to boldly step into the purposes and plans that God has for your life?

Bible In A Year Reading Plan

Day 121: Esther 5-9

Reflect on Esther's strategic invitation of King Xerxes to a banquet and her request for the salvation of her people in Esther 5. How does Esther's patience and wisdom in timing her plea challenge you to trust in God's timing and providence in your own prayers and petitions? Consider Haman's plot to destroy the Jews and Mordecai's honor for refusing to bow down to him in Esther 6-7. How does God's providential intervention in reversing Haman's schemes and bringing about justice for His people encourage you to trust in His sovereignty and deliverance in times of crisis?



Consider the significance of remembering and retelling the story of God's deliverance and faithfulness through the generations in Esther 9. How does the observance of Purim serve as a testimony to God's enduring love and protection for His people, inspiring gratitude and praise?

Bible In A Year Reading Plan Day 122: Esther 10- Job 4

Reflect on Mordecai's promotion to second in command in the Persian Empire and his legacy of leadership and influence in Esther 10. How does Mordecai's rise to power and recognition for his righteousness and service to his people illustrate the principle of God exalting the humble and faithful? Explore Eliphaz's counsel to Job and his understanding of God's justice and sovereignty in Job 4. How does Eliphaz's assertion that God punishes the wicked and rewards the righteous challenge your understanding of God's character and the nature of suffering?



Consider the tension between human wisdom and divine mystery as reflected in Job's dialogue with his friends in Job 4. How does Job's insistence on his innocence and his friends' attempts to explain his suffering highlight the limitations of human understanding in grappling with the complexities of life and faith?

Bible In A Year Reading Plan Day 123: Job 5-9

Consider Job's defense against his friends' accusations and his despair over his suffering in Job 6-7. How does Job's struggle to find meaning and purpose in his afflictions resonate with your own experiences of doubt and despair in the face of adversity? Explore Job's lamentation over the injustice of human suffering and his longing for an advocate to plead his case before God in Job 9. How does Job's cry for someone to mediate between him and God echo humanity's need for a Savior to bridge the gap between sinfulness and divine holiness?



Consider the importance of honest lament and wrestling with God's silence in times of suffering as modeled by Job in Job 6-9. How does Job's candid expression of his anguish and confusion encourage you to bring your own struggles and questions before God in prayer and supplication?
