Day 127- Job 15-19

Reflect on Job's assertion of his innocence and his plea for vindication in the face of his friends' accusations in Job 19. How does Job's unwavering confidence in his integrity challenge you to trust in God's righteousness and justice, even when circumstances seem unfair?

Day 128: Job 20-24

Day 130: Job 30-34

Day 131: Job 35-39
